
Silly Games - Summer Kickoff

Bob serves as an adjunct faculty in the Environmental Science Department at **KBOCC**, one of 37 Tribal College and Universities in the U.S. The College provides postsecondary education rich in Ojibwa culture, tradition, and beliefs that promotes lifelong learning in a culturally sensitive environment that is safe and conducive to learning. A few joys of being at the College: making new friends and professional colleagues, immersion into the Anishinaabe culture and the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community, the sheer beauty of the natural environment, and learning!

A beautiful bronze sculpture of an Atlantic salmon called Moment, is displayed with a sign that welcomes you to touch.
